Poor James ended up in England forgotten in a monastery in Sheen and terribly his skull was found being kicked around by a group of boys. That was interred in a church in London but his body is now under a golf course and I think there is a group trying to remedy that

She was young, alone, probably vulnerable in a hostile environment, among warring Lords and had a very young infant son to provide for and rule for. Her brother was a right hypocrite telling her to go back to her husband.

1502/3 was a very mixed year for the infant Tudor Court with the marriage and death of Arthur and death of Q E of York and the departure of Margaret to Scotland. It must have been an emotionally draining time.

H7 I believe accompanied his daughter as far as his mother's estates in Collyweston

[Sarah-Beth Watkins](#)0:48

Lorna - I don't think they had much of a relationship but Katherine sent her her priest to counsel her on not getting her divorce and touchingly also sent clothes when she was pregnant

[Sarah-Beth Watkins](#)0:49

RealTudorLady - I think it was a traumatic time for them all

[RealTudorLady](#)0:49

For Margaret and her father I think this must have been a traumatic parting. She didn't even have her mum anymore to say goodbye to her.

So really then Margaret and K.O.A whole relationship (loosely worded) was diplomatic when it suited them.

And unlike some Tudor mothers Elizabeth of York seems to have been particularly close to her children

It's a wonder they managed to carry on at all!

Yes, Sarah Beth I really do agree.

Lorna - I think you are right. I'm also unsure of Margaret's relationship with her sister Mary
