
Wyatt's Rebellion 1554



ACROSS

- This home of George Brooke, Baron Cobham, was besieged on 30th January 1554.
- It is thought that Wyatt wasn't always the leader of the rebellion, who is thought to have led the rebels at first? One of the rebels was Sir Nicholas
- 10 Wyatt's trial took place here on 15th March 1554.
- 12 Mary I gave a rousing speech at this place in London to rally Londoners to her cause.
- 13 The risings were scheduled to take place in Kent, the Midlands, the West Country and this county.
- 14 Wyatt met with his men at this place in Kent to organise the Kent uprisings.
- 15 Wyatt was arrested and imprisoned here.
- 16 Thomas Wyatt the Younger raised his standard at this Kent town on 25th January 1554.
- 17 The rebellion was caused by Mary's plans to marry this man.

18 The rebels sought to depose Mary I and replace her with Elizabeth, who would get married to this man.

DOWN

- Wyatt and his men were forced to surrender at this place in London.
- The rebels planned a fourfold rising to take place on this feast day in 1554.
- On 12th February 1554, Lady Jane Grey and this man were executed after Jane's father had been involved in the rebellion.
- On 21st January 1554, this bishop heard all about the rebellion.
- This duke joined the rebel cause in December 1553.
- Many of Mary I's troops led by this man mutinied and joined the rebels at the end of January 1554.
- 11 Wyatt successfully entered this place on 6th February 1554.
