
The Summer of 3 Monarchs

- 2 This Earl of Pembroke defected and persuaded members of Queen Jane's council to declare for Mary.
- When Jane was proclaimed queen here, a boy declared Mary was queen and had his ears cut off.
- The Duke of Northumberland greeted the new Queen Jane and Lord Guildford Dudley here on 10th July 1553.
- This Marquess of Northampton managed to escape serious punishment in July 1553 for his support of Queen Jane.
- 11 The Duke of Northumberland was in this city when he was arrested on 21st July 1553.
- 12 This man was sent from London with forces to apprehend Mary.
- 15 When he first wrote his devise for the succession, Edward chose the male heirs of this woman as the first in
- 16 The profession of Robert Reyns who made haste to tell Mary news of Edward's death.
- 17 This Earl of Arundel also betrayed Queen Jane, helping Pembroke persuade the council to support Mary.

19 Mary made this Suffolk property her base to rally support.

DOWN

- 1 This Bishop of London denounced Mary and Elizabeth as "bastards" at St Paul's Cross on 9th July 1553.
- This man ripped down the cloth of estate and informed Jane she was no longer queen on 19th July 1553.
- Sir Henry visited crews on ships stationed off the East Coast and persuaded them to support Mary instead of Jane.
- The other name for consumption, a possible cause of death for Edward VI.
- 8 Edward VI died her on 6th July 1553. 10 In April 1552, Edward VI fell ill with smallpox and which may have suppressed his immune system and been a factor in his death in 1553.
- 13 Mary set off for her estates in this part of England when she realised there may be a plot against her.
- 14 Mary gathered her household together here on 8th July and proclaimed herself queen.
- 18 Mary was at this property when she received news that her brother was dying.
