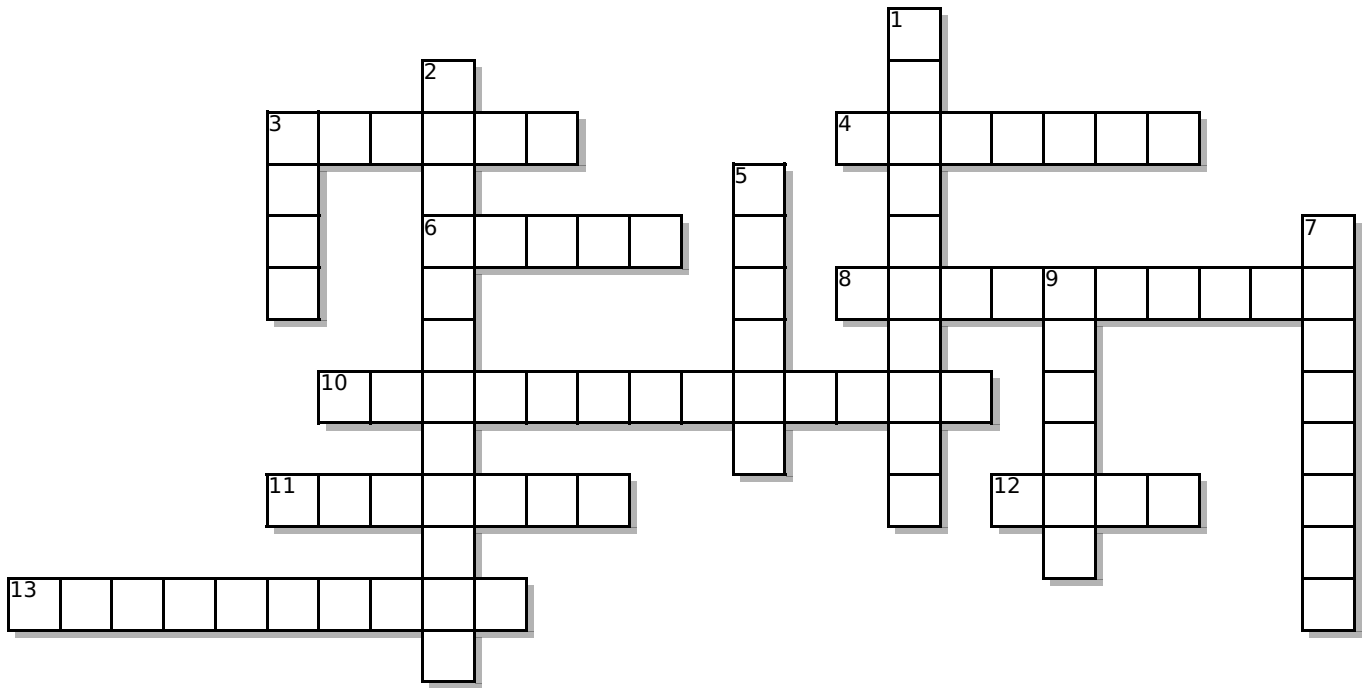


Tudor Poisonings



ACROSS

- 3 In 1594, Ferdinando Stanley, 5th Earl of Derby, took this stone believing himself to have been poisoned.
- 4 In 1594, Ferdinando Stanley, 5th Earl of Derby, took this horn believing himself to have been poisoned.
- 6 In 1598, Edward Squire was accused of plotting to poison a chair belonging to this earl.
- 8 Cardinal Christopher was poisoned to death in Italy in 1514.
- 10 This royal physician was executed in 1594 after allegedly plotting to poison Elizabeth I.
- 11 It was thought that Pope Clement VII's death in 1534 was caused by poison mushrooms or poisoned
- 12 Philip Howard, 13th Earl of Arundel, died in 1557 after eating this roasted bird, which, had allegedly been poisoned.
- 13 Richard Roose was accused of poisoning members of this man's household in 1531.

DOWN

- 1 In 1537, Janet Douglas, Lady Glamis, was burnt to death for plotting to poison this person.
- 2 Lady Margaret Douglas had dined with this man a few days before her death in 1578, leading to rumours of poisoning.
- 3 It was said that Catherine of Aragon's illness had become worse after consuming Welsh
- 5 In 1598, Edward Squire was executed for plotting to poison this item belonging to Elizabeth I.
- 7 The type of mushroom said, by some, to have caused the death of Pope Clement VII in 1534.
- 9 Richard Roose was to death after being accused of poisoning.
